The Bloodborne Pathogens course is designed for individuals who may be exposed to blood and body fluids during the performance of their work and who wish to gain a more thorough understanding of blood-borne pathogens, prevention of occupational exposure, and exposure follow-up.

Course Content

The Blood-borne Pathogens Course consists of 6 modules. The outline for the course material is as follows:

- Module 1: Introduction to Blood-borne Pathogens
- Module 2: Viral Hepatitis and HBV Exposure
- Module 3: Viral Hepatitis and HCV Exposure
- Module 4: Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) Exposure
- Module 5: Prevention of Blood-borne Pathogen Exposure
- Module 6: Blood and Body Fluid Exposure Follow-up

Course Objectives

Upon completion of the Blood-borne Pathogens course the participant will be able to:

1. Recognize the hazards associated with occupational exposure to blood and body fluids.
2. Be familiar with the steps to prevent exposure to blood and body fluids.
3. Know the steps that should be taken following exposure to blood and body fluids.

Evaluation Process

At the end of each module, there is a quiz that each course participant must challenge and successfully complete with a passing grade before continuing to the next content module. Module quizzes are review and evaluation tools that assist in preparing the course participant for the formal timed examinations following completion of Modules 3 and Module 6, followed by a final exam.

Course Duration

The course is self-paced so course duration will depend on the individual participant and prior knowledge of the course subject matter. On average, the course will take 1.0 – 1.5 hours to complete each of the 6 modules.
